The jazz bands visitors included Bill Cunliffe, the wonderful Grammy-nominated piano player and composer, and Flea, the bass player with the "Red Hot Chili Peppers".

William Bing, Director of Bands at Caltech, has been teaching at Caltech for over thirty years. During that time, the bands have played many premieres and performed for over ten thousand people. In addition to his work at Caltech, Bill is a busy trumpet player. Bill has performed with many groups, including but not limited to the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra, the Los Angeles Master Chorale, the Pacific Symphony, the Los Angeles Opera Orchestra, and the California Philharmonic. Composers he has worked with include Howard Hanson, Roy Harris, Alan Hovhaness, Olivier Messiaen, John Adams, John Harbison, Henry Mancini, and John Williams. Bill's trumpet students have performed with the "Red Hot Chili Peppers", "Green Day", "The Duke Ellington Orchestra", "Pancho Sanchez", "Reel Big Fish", the Los Angeles Philharmonic and many other groups and ensembles. Bill and his wife Delores have won many teaching awards, and most recently were named Honorary Membership in the Caltech Alumni Association.

An eclectic musician and actor, **Barry Schwam** was first introduced to the Theremin about six years ago. Having to find notes in mid air, makes this unique electronic instrument the only one in the world played without touching it! He also plays other odd instruments, such as the Autoharp, Jews Harp, and the Kazoo-O-Whistle, which he invented. As an actor, Barry Schwam has played about 50 character roles ranging in everything from Scrooge, and The Nerd, to Abraham Lincoln; from blackmailing butlers to absent minded professors. Patrick Olguin, trumpet and vocalist with the Thursday Jazz Band, is a software engineer, performing Independent Validation and Verification of Spacecraft Flight Software for NASA space exploration missions. He has worked on the Mars Rovers, Mars Reconnaissance Orbiter and is currently working on Kepler, whose mission is to search for other terrestrial planets.

Kjerstin 'KJ' Williams has a broad vocal and stylistic range. Her repertoire spans a spectrum from jazz, standards, swing, and showtunes to the great choral masterworks. KJ performs locally with her jazz combo, the Conspirators, and has appeared as a soloist with a variety of Los Angeles area big bands, wind ensembles, and choral groups. She is featured on several of the Caltech Jazz Bands' studio recordings and recently made her Carnegie Hall debut as a soloist with the Caltech-Occidental Concert Band. In between gigs, KJ pursued robotics research, receiving her B.S., M.S., and Ph.D. in Electrical Engineering from from the California Institute of Technology, which earned her the nickname "Dr. Diva." When she's not singing, she puts those degrees to use as a robotics engineer at Applied Minds, Inc. in Glendale, California.

Tom Mannion came to Caltech on October 11, 1993 as Director of Undergraduate and Graduate Housing. Prior to coming to Caltech, Tom held various positions at The George Washington University in Housing and Residence Life. In 1991, Tom received the honor of Advisor of the Year from the National Association of College and University Residence Halls. After leaving Washington D.C., Tom worked with Allen and O'Hara – a national firm that planned, built and managed student housing as a private enterprise just outside of many campuses. After settling in with Allen and O'Hara, Tom started a successful consulting business, advising in the areas of personality preferences and teamwork.

Since arriving at Caltech, Tom's responsibilities have grown. Over the course of 14 years (and 14 different bosses) Tom has had many various positions related to student services. A couple of years ago, Tom began a new position as Assistant Vice President for Campus Life. The new position covers areas such as Student Life as well as oversight of a broad array of student and campus events, pranks, student government advising, student-alumni/ae relations, club advising and the Caltech cooking class.

Tom's previous musical activities include Pennsylvania District Band for the Euphonium/Baritone Horn; District, Regional and State orchestra for the String Bass; and District Student Conductor.
