# **Biographies**

**William Bing** began teaching at Caltech in 1970, when he was a graduate student at USC. He took a leave from Caltech from 1972-1974, to play in the San Antonio Symphony. After two years in Texas, he realized that playing and teaching in Los Angeles was a better fit for him than a full time orchestra position in San Antonio. On his return to Los Angeles, he was invited back to teach at Caltech, and he's been here ever since, combining a teaching and playing career. While his main teaching focus has always been the Caltech Bands, he did find time to play and record with several of the major orchestras in the Los Angeles area, including the Los Angeles Philharmonic and the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra. For ten years, he was a member of the Los Angeles Opera Orchestra, and for five years he performed regularly with the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra. Artists he has performed with include Placido Domingo, John Williams, Henry Mancini, Trisha Yearwood, James Levine, and many others. As a trumpet teacher, his many students have performed with the "Red Hot Chili Peppers", "Green Day", Poncho Sanchez, the "Duke Ellington Orchestra", Dr. Dre, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Pacific Symphony, and many other classical, jazz, and rock groups. He has won the ASCIT Teaching Award from the students at Caltech, and been named an honorary member of the Caltech Alumni Association.

The **Caltech-Occidental Concert Band** rehearses one night a week for less than two hours at each rehearsal. That the band members are able to learn a great deal of music in so short a time is a true testament to their hard work and high level of musicianship. Tonight's concert, for example, was prepared in only eight rehearsals of less than two hours each. Former soloists with the ensemble include Allan Vogel (principal oboist with the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra), Jim Self (tuba player with the Los Angeles Opera Orchestra), Allen Vizzutti (world renowned trumpet soloist), Loren Marsteller (premiere baritone and trombone soloist with the Marine Band and California Philharmonic), and many others. The band has played in Carnegie Hall and only last year performed in China at the Great Wall and Tsinghua University. Regular guest conductor **Paul Asimow** has a lengthy association with the Band going back to 1991 when he started graduate school at Caltech in geology. Having been student conductor of the Harvard University Band, he was excited to continue conducting at Caltech. Now an Associate Professor of Geology and Geochemistry, Paul has conducted and played in the group for over 18 years on piccolo, flute, Bb tuba and his current favorite, the oddball F tuba. In his spare time he recruits band members to major in geology and geology majors to play in the band.

Critics rave, "Julia Heinen is a sensation," "Absolutely brilliant," "Plays with intensity, conviction and impressive virtuosity."

As a soloist, Julia Heinen has performed hundreds of recitals throughout the United States and had the distinct pleasure of premiering several works written specifically for her. In February of 2003, she performed a recital including several new works at Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall culminating in a compact disc recording including several of these pieces released in the Fall of 2007 by Centaur Records. A new recording of chamber works for the Tapestry Ensemble: a quartet of oboe, clarinet, cello and piano will be released in the spring of 2012 by PARMA.

In addition to Dr. Heinen's solo performances she is often heard as a chamber musician performing most notably with the Tapestry Ensemble, a quartet of oboe, clarinet, cello and piano and the TEMPO New Music Ensemble. She is also an accomplished ensemble player having served as principal clarinetist with the American Wind Symphony, a professional wind ensemble which tours the United States and Europe. As an orchestral player, she has served as principal clarinetist with the Augusta, Dubuque, Greenville, LaCrosse, Rochester and Valdosta Symphony Orchestras and was featured several times as a concerto soloist with those ensembles. In addition, her orchestral performances also include several concerts with the Minnesota Orchestra.

As an artist and clinician for the Buffet and Rico Corporations, Dr. Heinen does frequent clinics and masterclasses in many universities and colleges throughout the United States. Originally from Minnesota, she currently lives in Los Angeles, where she serves as professor of music at California State University, Northridge, teaching clarinet and coaching chamber music. She served as the artistic director of ClarinetFest® 2011 and continues her work with this organization as the state of California Chair of the International Clarinet Association. She holds a masters degree from the University of Michigan, an artist diploma from Northwestern University and a doctorate from the University of Minnesota. Her teachers have included Herbert Blayman, Robert Marcellus and J. Cloyde Williams.

Julia Heinen is a Buffet Group USA and Rico Reeds Performing Artist and plays exclusively on Tosca clarinets and Reserve Classic reeds.

**Jeff Leblow** is a third-year student at Occidental currently working on a major in Music and a minor in Chemistry. He is an Orange County native, having played first chair trombone in his high school's jazz band, which took bronze-first, and second best overall in the category of high school jazz bands, at the 2009 Heritage Jazz Festival in Orlando, Florida. He has played the violin since the 7th grade, and the trombone since 10th grade. On trombone, he has studied under Loren Marsteller and Sheffer Bruton. Jeff is studying music composition at Oxy under the tutelage of Andre Myers, and has written pieces for string quartet, wind quintet, as well as solo works for trombone. His pieces have been performed in on-campus concerts. His current musical interests include conducting, electronic music composition, and learning to play the ocarina. Jeff has been a member of Oxy-Jazz, Occidental College's jazz ensemble, for three years and a member of the Occidental-Caltech Concert Band since Fall of 2010, playing first and second trombone.

**Christina Loza** is a 4th year graduate student in chemical engineering. Her research interests are secondary organic aerosol formation and atmospheric chemistry. She began playing the clarinet in 1997 and has been participating in band ever since. Christine's first conducting experience was as assistant drum major for the University of Notre Dame band (Go Irish!), and she is delighted that Bill is giving her the opportunity to conduct a piece with the Caltech/Oxy concert band.

**Lynne Snyder** graduated summa cum laude from Colorado State University with a bachelor degree in clarinet performance. In addition to teaching privately for over fifteen years, she currently performs with the Los Angeles Clarinet Choir, the Caltech-Occidental Concert Band, the Glendale Community Orchestra, and the La Canada Presbyterian Church Orchestra. Her recent endeavors include teaching master classes for the Caltech-Occidental Concert Band woodwind section and directing the Caltech Clarinet Choir. When she is not in rehearsal, she studies with Yehuda Gilad, is "Mom" to three fabulous children, and competes in triathlons.

**Jeffrey Thompson** is a 4th year graduate student working on his doctorate in Geophysics with a PhD minor in Civil Engineering. An avid trombonist, he started playing in 6th grade. While studying geology at the University of Southern California, Je! was a four year member of the Trojan Marching Band during the winningest four year period in the history of Trojan Football. At Caltech, Jeff has performed with the Caltech/Oxy Symphony Orchestra, the Caltech/Oxy Concert Band, the Monday Jazz Band, the Thursday Jazz Band, the Occidental Glee Club, and the Caltech Brass Quintet, as well as directing the Slide Rule Trombone Choir and the Caltech Pep Band. Despite this lengthy résumé, this evening marks the first time Jeff is conducting a band in concert while neither being in a gym, nor with a trombone in hand.

**Sean Wakayama** has performed 20 seasons with Caltech-Occidental Concert Band since joining as a freshman in 1984. In addition to this group, he has appeared as principal and solo clarinetist with the Stanford Symphonic Band and Honolulu Youth Symphony. He was also the principal clarinetist for the 1983 and 1984 Oahu Band Directors Association High School Select Bands. He is currently a member of the Caltech Clarinet Choir. Having earned B.S. and M.S. degrees from the California Institute of Technology and a Ph.D. in Aeronautics and Astronautics from Stanford University, he is currently an associate technical fellow at Boeing in Huntington Beach. He is thankful for the time that his wife and two daughters have allowed him to practice and rehearse for this musical performance.

A native North Carolinian, **Jeremy Yager** started playing bass clarinet in the 7th grade, when the switch from clarinet allowed him to ask his parents for a new band method book to replace the one he'd lost. Now, in addition to various clarinets, he also plays bass trombone andtuba, and once played baritone horn in the NC State University Marching Band. This is, however, his first experience as a conductor. When he doesn't have a horn of some sort in his hand, Jeremy designs electronics for spacecraft at JPL. He is the lead designer of an integrated circuit for use on the next Mars rover, and is also involved in designing an satellite imager that will help scientists understand more about aerosols and clouds and their effect on climate change.

**Madeleine Youngs** started playing flute in  $5^{th}$  grade. By sophomore year in high school she switched to the French horn. She was a member of the Santa Monica High School Symphony Orchestra, Wind Ensemble, and Marching Band. Now as a member of the Caltech-Oxy Concert Band, she makes her conducting debut. On the science side of things, she loves learning about almost everything. She is currently a freshman studying environmental science and engineering and has been doing research with ocean gliders in the Antarctic.
